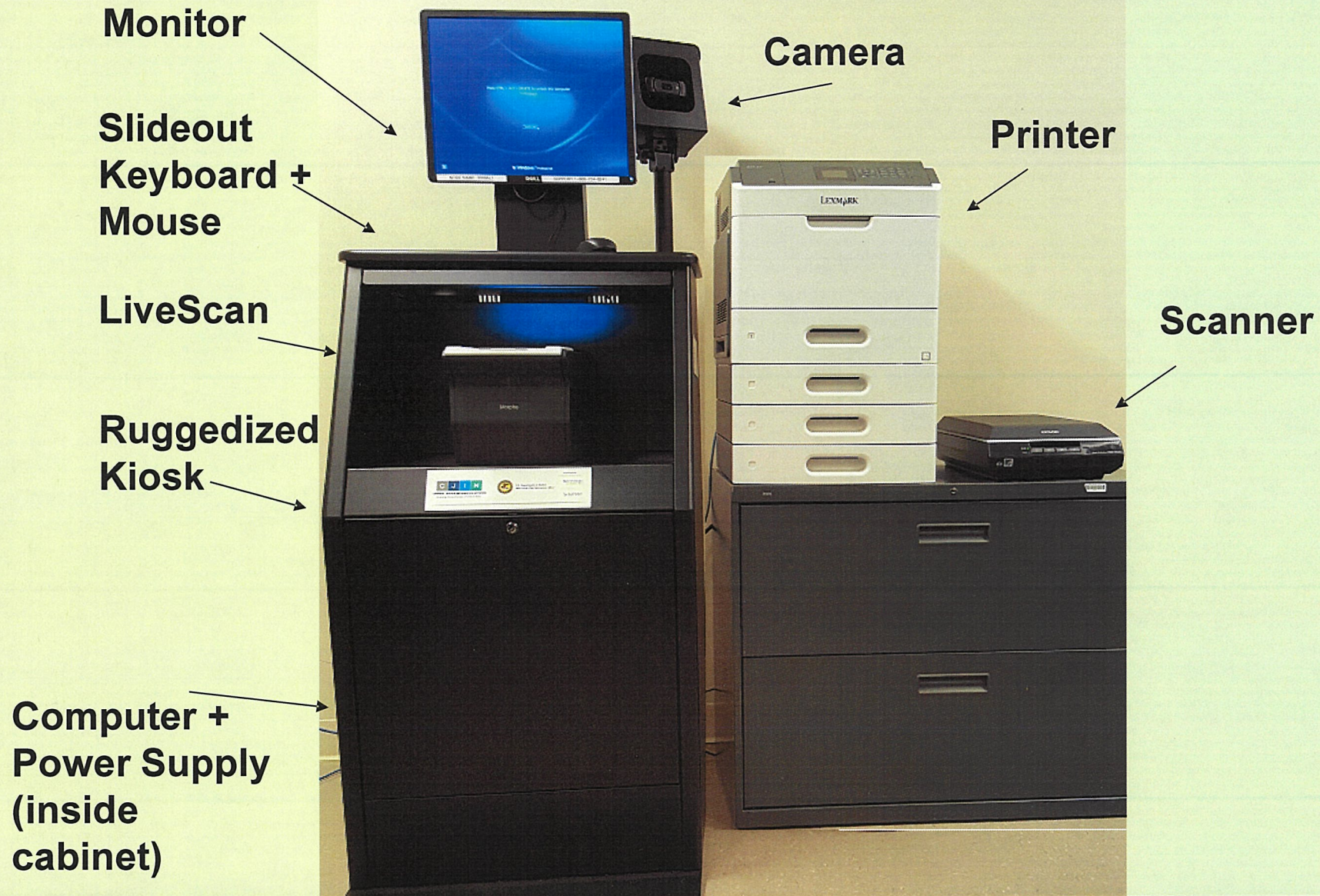

CJIS Systems: DOJ JCIS and State Networks

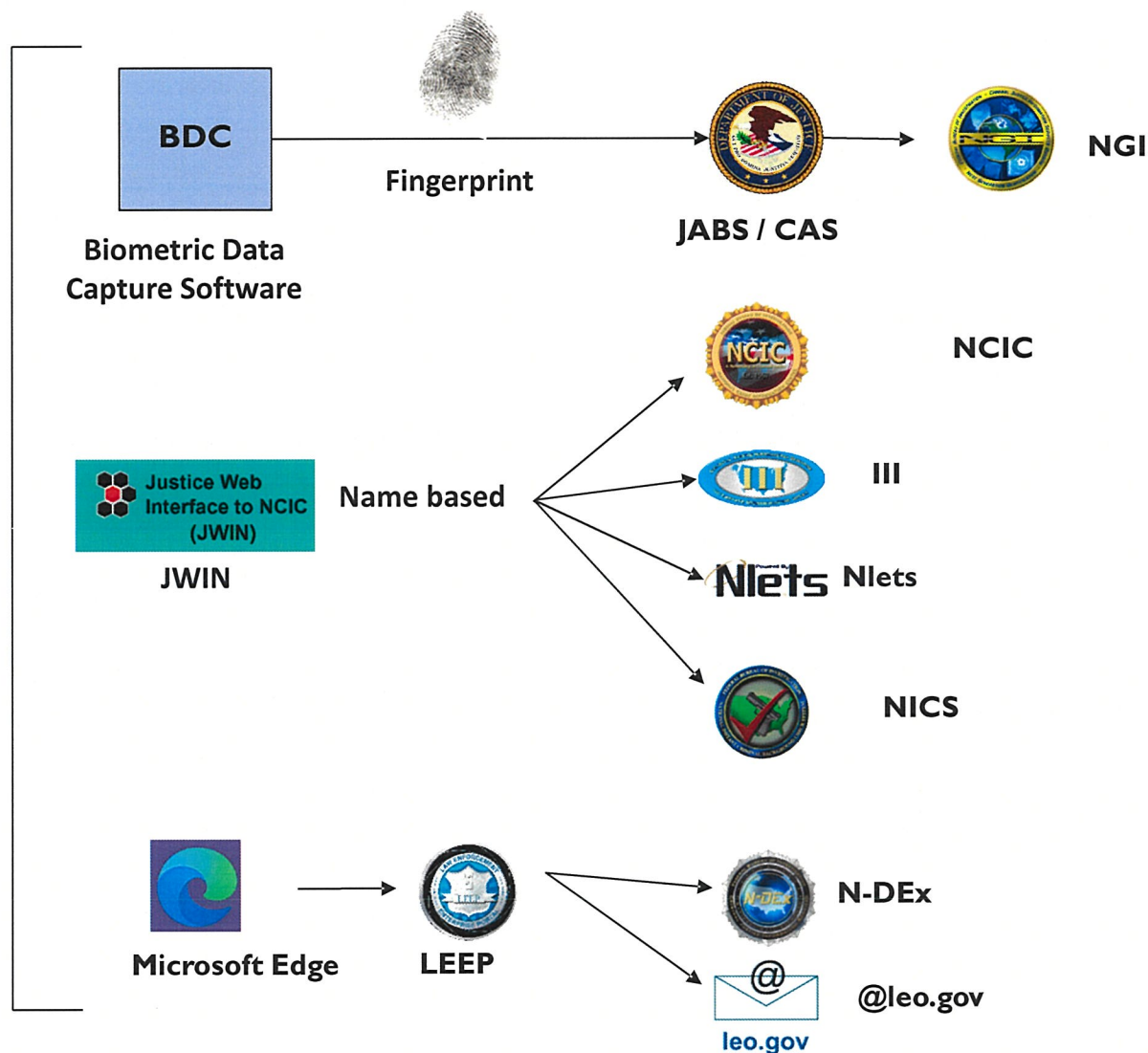


- FBI's Criminal Justice Information Systems Division(CJIS) FBI maintains the FBI's central repository for criminal justice information servicesand provides a telecommunication network to the CJIS System Agency (CSA) in each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, U.S. Territories, Canada, and various federal agencies including DOJ.
- Tribal access to FBI CJIS-maintained information is authorized by federal law. Authorized tribal agencies access this information either through a State CSA or through the DOJ TAP.
- DOJ is the CSA for several federal agencies as well as for federally recognized tribes participating in TAP. The network DOJ manages is called Justice Criminal Information Services (JCIS).
- Tribes will also have access to State level information (e.g Drivers License, Vehicle Registrations) via Nlets which is a private interstate data-sharing network operated by the individual States.

NGI is a Biometric database

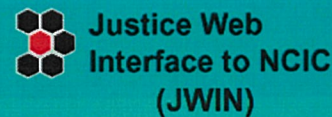
- Provides verification of identity and access to fingerprint-based criminal histories.

What participating agencies can do through TAP



- **SORNA Officers** can process complete sex offender registration and check-ins, including fingerprints, palm prints and mug shots. (*MESA and OpenFox Messenger*)
- **Police and Correctional Officers** can process criminal bookings. (*NGI/III via MESA*)
- **Police** can query persons and property, including missing persons, wanted persons, stolen property, recovered guns, and registered sex offenders. (*NCIC via OpenFox Messenger*)
- **Police** can access databases for officer safety-related information, including gang members and known or suspected terrorists. (*LEEP*). (*NCIC via OpenFox Messenger*)
- **Police and Criminal courts** can enter arrest warrants into national databases for off-reservation awareness and enforcement. (*NCIC via OpenFox Messenger*)
- **Prosecutors** can enter charging documents and dispositions for criminal charges to keep prohibited individuals from purchasing firearms. (*NICS via OpenFox Messenger*)
- **All LE CJAs and NLE-CJAs** can conduct queries in the National Data Exchange (N-DEx) to obtain national historical case information and cross-check police reports for investigative purposes. (*LEEP/N-DEx*)

What participating agencies can do through TAP



- **Pretrial services** can obtain complete criminal histories to make release recommendations. (*III via OpenFox Messenger*)
- **Police and correctional officers** can conduct fingerprint-based inquiries on people refusing to identify themselves to ascertain true identity and criminal history. (*NGI/III via MESA*)
- **Probation and parole officers** can conduct name-based checks to determine if supervised individuals have new charges. (*III via OpenFox Messenger*)
- **Civil Courts (Domestic Violence/Stalking)** can conduct name-based checks in conjunction to orders of protection as well as enter orders of protection. (*NCIC/III via OpenFox Messenger*)
- **Social Services can conduct fingerprint-based** record checks on employees, prospective employees, and volunteers who have regular contact with or control over Indian children, such as foster care, schools, daycare, school transportation, and parks and recreation (*MESA and LEEP*)
- **CPS can conduct name-based** criminal history and NCIC checks in cases on child abuse, neglect or exploitation (*OpenFox Messenger Only*)
- **Child Support Enforcement** (*Limited NLETS access via OpenFox Messenger*) can conduct drivers' license and vehicle registration checks in support of Child Support Enforcement activities

What participating agencies can do through TAP



- **Human Resources (HR) can:**

- conduct **fingerprint-based** record checks on employees, prospective employees, and volunteers who have regular contact with or control over Indian children, such as schools, daycare, school transportation, and parks and recreation. (*MESA and LEEP*)

- **Housing can:**

- request law enforcement to conduct name-based checks employees or prospective employees and to screen applicants or tenants receiving housing assistance, and for lease enforcement or eviction
- conduct fingerprint-based record checks for employees or prospective employees and to screen applicants or tenants receiving housing assistance, and for lease enforcement or eviction. (*MESA and LEEP*)

TAP Roles and Responsibilities



- **TAP Point of Contact**

- The Tribal POC is a senior Tribal leader, who serves as the primary point of contact (POC) between Tribe and DOJ/TAP

- **TAP Terminal Agency Coordinator**

- Each agency using JCIS systems has a Terminal Agency Coordinator (TAC) who serves as the point-of-contact between the DOJ CJIS Systems Officer (CSO) and the agency for all matters relating to JCIS systems including agency compliance with JCIS policies
- These responsibilities may be delegated by the TAC but the TAC remains accountable for all delegated responsibilities, and cannot delegate core TAC functions

- **DOJ Business Relationship Manager (BRM)**

- TAP team representative assigned to liaison with the Tribe and tribal agencies



- The ORI is a nine-character identifier assigned by FBI CJIS which authorizes agencies to access criminal justice information and identifies the agency in all transactions
- Tribal Agencies should be aware of other ORIs when reviewing criminal histories

What is Criminal Justice Information



- Criminal Justice Information (CJI) is all information provided by FBI CJIS to support law enforcement and civil agency missions such as: biometric, identity history, biographic, property, and case/incident history data.
- CJI must be safeguarded in accordance with CJIS guidelines while it is in transit, being stored, or being destroyed.
- Persons accessing CJI must complete:
 - Fingerprint-based Background Check and
 - CJIS Security Awareness Training (CSAT)
 - NCIC Operators must take NCIC training and pass certification test
 - Demonstrated need to view and use the information



- **What does agency service model mean?**
 - Answer: Determines how agencies will work with each other to share criminal justice information
- **Why are agency service models important?**
 - Answer: The agency service model specifically identifies what each agency will do, who they will partner with, and the responsibilities of each agency when sharing criminal justice information
- **What are the three types of service models?**
 - Self-Service
 - Servicing agency providing full CJI to serviced agency
 - Servicing agency providing Go/No Go to serviced agency

How your Agencies are Handling CJI



How will CJI be transmitted between agencies?

Possible solutions:

- Email using LEEP
- Hand carry in a concealed manner
- Mail

How will agencies store CJI?

Possible solutions:

- Locked office
- Locked drawer/cabinet
- Place in an envelope/folder

How will CJI be destroyed?

Possible solutions:

- Shred/Burn
- WHO is performing the above function is important

- Ensure that your agencies identify and document any internal processes
- An audit may occur within the next year and then every 3 years for both HR and CJA
- As CSA for Tribes, DOJ is audited as well

Summary



- TAP provides access to FBI CJIS criminal justice information databases
- TAP workstation has three applications that provide access to more than half dozen criminal information databases.
 - Fingerprint-based checks (MESA)
 - Name-based checks (OpenFox Messenger)
 - Browser (Law Enforcement Enterprise Portal)
- An ORI is assigned to each agency participating in TAP and determines what agencies can access and under what conditions
- Criminal Justice Information (CJI) is a protected type of information.
 - Must meet CJIS Security Policy requirements for access
 - Policies in place for CJI in-transit, at rest, and for destruction
- Service Model defines who (what agency) will perform which services (various record checks) for another agency and the policies around this agreement
